Shayonna is brought for follow-up by her teenage mother, Sharon Jackson. She is referred from the JHH/TAC Clinic. Since March of 1994, mother and child have been living at 2418 E. Jefferson Street, 21205. The mother attends school. The child goes to a babysitter from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in the 600 block of N. Montford Avenue, 21205. The babysitter is Mary McKenzie (675-5042). About every other weekend the child stays with the paternal grandmother who lives out near the Alameda and Northern Parkway at 2825 Yorkwood Drive. This is a modern house and there is no scaling paint. The only scaling paint is that at E. Jefferson Street, where it appears that paint is peeling from all the woodwork. The home has never been inspected for lead. Mother states that they are cleaning with Thorofare brand detergent with phosphate. They wet mop the floors, windows, window wells every other day with this solution prepared as recommended in this clinic. The child often sucks on toys and sucks on her hands daily. She was seen mouthing both a toy and her fingers during the clinic visit. Calcium intake may be somewhat excessive. The child gets 32 oz. of WCM per day, one to two slices of cheese per day, ice cream daily, pudding almost daily and extra milk on her cereal so that in milk equivalents she may be getting close to 40 oz. per day. Mother is advised to cut the milk she drinks back to about 24 oz. per day. She gets liver twice a month. Other meats include ²³⁷⁻²³⁰⁸past, steak, turkey, chicken without the skin. (675-5042)

This child has been in good health since last seen. There are no known allergies, no current medication and no recent exposure to contagious childhood diseases. Immunizations are up to date.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION:

This child is noted to have a PE tube in place in the right tympanic membrane. She is a tad obese. Otherwise, no significant abnormalities were noted.

Review of serial laboratory data show that during the past five months there has been no essential change in this child's blood lead concentration. Measurements have fluctuated between 18 and 21 μg Pb/dL whole blood. One wonders whether there is a whole lot of lead paint in this dwelling although when given the address one would certainly expect that.
